

Maundy Thursday Service

PRELUDE:

WELCOME:

The service of worship tonight is taken from an early Christian service called Tenebrae. "Tenebrae" is Latin for "darkness" or "shadows." Tonight, we will experience a symbolic portion of Christ's pain and suffering the day of his crucifixion. One of the most conspicuous features of the service is the gradual extinguishing of candles until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. As it gets darker and darker we reflect on the great emotional and physical pain that was very real for Jesus that evening. Toward the end of the service, the Christ candle is hidden, typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil over good. The hidden candle is then restored to its place on Easter morning. By dim light we all depart this service in silence.

CALL TO WORSHIP:

Jesus said: I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. **Just as Christ has loved us, let us love one another.**

Beloved people of God: This is the day when Christ, our Passover Lamb, surrendered himself to those who would kill him, setting us free from sin and death forever.

This is the day when Christ, our Teacher and Lord, knelt down to wash the disciples' feet, showing us how to love and serve one another.

This is the day when Christ, the bread of heaven, shared a holy meal with his followers, offering a feast of abundant life and grace for all.

CONFESSION AND PARDON:

Eternal God, whose covenant with us is never broken, we confess that we fail to fulfill your will. Though you have bound yourself to us, we will not bind ourselves to you. Lead us once again to your table and unite us to Christ, who is the bread of life and the vine from which we grow in grace.

PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING:

We thank you for the deep love of Jesus, which moved him to give himself for the redemption of all creation. WORDS OF INSTITUTION:

Leader: On the night of his arrest Jesus took bread, and after giving thanks to God, broke it and said, "This is my body which is for you; do this remembering me."

After supper Jesus took the cup and said, "This is the cup of the new covenant; whenever you drink it, do so remembering me."

PRAYER OF CONSECRATION:

Creator God, we thank you for the nourishment you give us -- for bread, and fruit of the vine. God of freedom, we thank you that you do not leave us in bondage, but act in power to liberate us from all oppression. We thank you that Christ, acting in courage and faith, has won for us the victory over sin and death. May the bread and wine be signs of your renewed covenant with us, and may we be ever faithful, until the coming of your final Shalom. Amen.
