Praise the Lord!

Praise the Lord from heaven!

Praise God in the heights!

Psalm 148:1

Dear Friends,

An issue that I have always struggled with in my ministry is the intersection of faith and politics. I am sure you have your opinions. From what I have received over the years, the range of responses include:

"Please, John, I come to worship on Sunday to praise God, to confess sin and to hear a message of love, peace, reconciliation and love. Sunday morning for me is a 'charging station.' When I hear a political sermon, it doesn't bring me peace."



"John, I clearly know where your vote goes and what political party you belong to. I don't agree with you. I don't come to church to be scolded."

"John, preach more about Jesus. We need to hear more about the wages of sin and the message of Christ's salvation."

"John, God is neither a Democrat or a Republican. You should not take sides."

"John, you missed an opportunity to preach on gun violence, abortion, LGBTQA+, racial equity."

"John, I need direction about what is important. I like being stirred up."

"John, thank you for encouraging me to get involved. This is why I am a Christian."

I am sure there are other reactions.

Trust me, I feel the tension. I want the church to be a place where all God's children are accepted for who they are and where they are on the journey. I am very aware that I don't have all the answers; what I preach is usually what I am struggling with in my own life.

But the prophets and Jesus pull no punches when they are railing against the leaders of their time and how they mistreat the poor, the homeless, the widow, the orphan, and the stranger.

I find the words of Jesus to conflict often with capitalistic imperialism and the view of cultural exceptionalism.

I find the gospel message very clear:

All are welcome because we are made in the likeness and image of God.

In Jesus Christ there is no slave or free, Jew or Greek, male or female.

We confess our sins and commit to doing better.

Our individual choices are shaped by the common good.

Therefore, I am compelled to preach on issues of inclusion, racial equity, healthcare, environment, violence and how our choices reflect the way, the truth and the life of Jesus.

If the scripture is the living word, then it must speak to our time and age as well.

My preaching is shaped (and this is a bias) by my emphasis on the call to the community more so than to the individual. Of course, our individual relationship with Jesus Christ is vital. We need to cultivate our personal spiritual disciples of prayer, study, and worship. But we are the "Body of Christ"- a collective. I think many Christians overemphasize personal, individual feeling at the expense of communal call and responsibility.

This is why, from the beginning of my call to FHC, I have emphasized BOTH the "journey inward" AND the "journey outward."

Being political means being alive. Politics comes from the Greek word "polis" which means "city." Being political means how we live together and order our lives. Jesus came with a political message: "The kingdom of God is here!" and it judges every other kingdom, particularly wealthy, imperialistic nations.

We can disagree about the partisan details, but I believe we need to be both agitated and comforted by the political words of Jesus that call us in a community of love, peace, justice and joy.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Sixteen Elders currently serve on Session. They lead the following Ministries: Trustees, Justice and Mission, Adult Spiritual Growth, Family Youth and Children, Deacons, Worship, Stewardship, Nominating and Church Growth. Photos of these Elders are featured on one of the bulletin boards outside of Fellowship Hall. You may talk with any of the Elders if you want to learn more about the work of Session.

Session met on May 24 and June 28. Pastor John Lentz was the Moderator for both meetings.

After opening with prayer in May, John led the Elders in a spiritual conversation about the calling of the church. The Calling of the Church as described in the Book of Order can be summarized in this manner:

The Church is the body of Christ. Christ gives to the Church all the gifts necessary to be his body. The Church strives to demonstrate these gifts in its life as a community in the world. The Church is to be a community of faith, a community of hope, a community of love and a community of witness.

The question for Elders was "How is Forest Hill Church living into this calling?"

Following this discussion, Session accomplished the following:

- Approved upcoming baptisms for Karter Addysen and Krew Ashton Seigneur, Michael William Banks and Casey Marshall Ball;
- •Reviewed the latest financial report;
- •Reviewed requests for Endowment Grants and approved the following, to be sent to the Endowment Committee for approval:

- •Learned about plans by Adult Spiritual Growth to host "Linger for a While" small group conversations following morning worship that will explore topics of interest;
- Approved the recommendation of the Personnel Committee to rescind the requirement for proof of COVID vaccination and masks for staff.
- Pastor Lentz reported on the ongoing process of the Congregation Conversations with a debrief that was led by Equius Group on May 21 and attended by over 90 congregants. The discussion included markers of healing as well as good and positive parts of the journey, so far.

After opening with prayer at the June meeting, Elders discussed the plans to seek a consultant to help the church continue the process of discerning its call for the future.

Following this discussion, Session accomplished the following:

- Approved the upcoming baptism of Anderson Michael Robert Caminiti;
- Learned that the Endowment Committee approved the requested endowment grants;
- Approved the requests of Paula and Tom Harvey to be removed from the membership roll;
- Reviewed the latest financial report;
- •Reviewed a forecast of income and expenses for the remainder of the year;
- Approved for the church to serve as fiscal sponsor for the Cooper Andrews Memorial Fund;
- Approved for the church to provide an organizational endorsement for the "Vote No on Issue 1" initiative;
- Approved the creation of the Kemp Jaycox Environmental Sustainability Fund, to be operated as an endowed fund and managed by the Endowment Committee;
- •Pastor Lentz presented information on the Medical Debt Jubilee Program, an initiative that raises funds to buy out medical debt and then cancel the obligations of the debtors. Greater Cleveland Congregations is planning an interfaith program around this initiative with the goal to raise as much as \$40,000 and thereby cancel as much as \$4,000,000 in debt in Cuyahoga County. This will be discussed further at a future meeting before any decision is made about FHC participation.

News From Greater Cleveland Congregations (GCC)



GCC has just launched a **Vote No on Issue 1** Campaign because "GCC's commitment to democracy is long-term and Issue 1 is a direct threat to our democracy." The threat

is not only the change from a majority vote to the 60% requirement but also that this vote will be by special election, elections Ohio had previously stopped using because of cost (around \$20 million) and low voter turnout.

August 5: 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. August 6: 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.


Aug. 7




