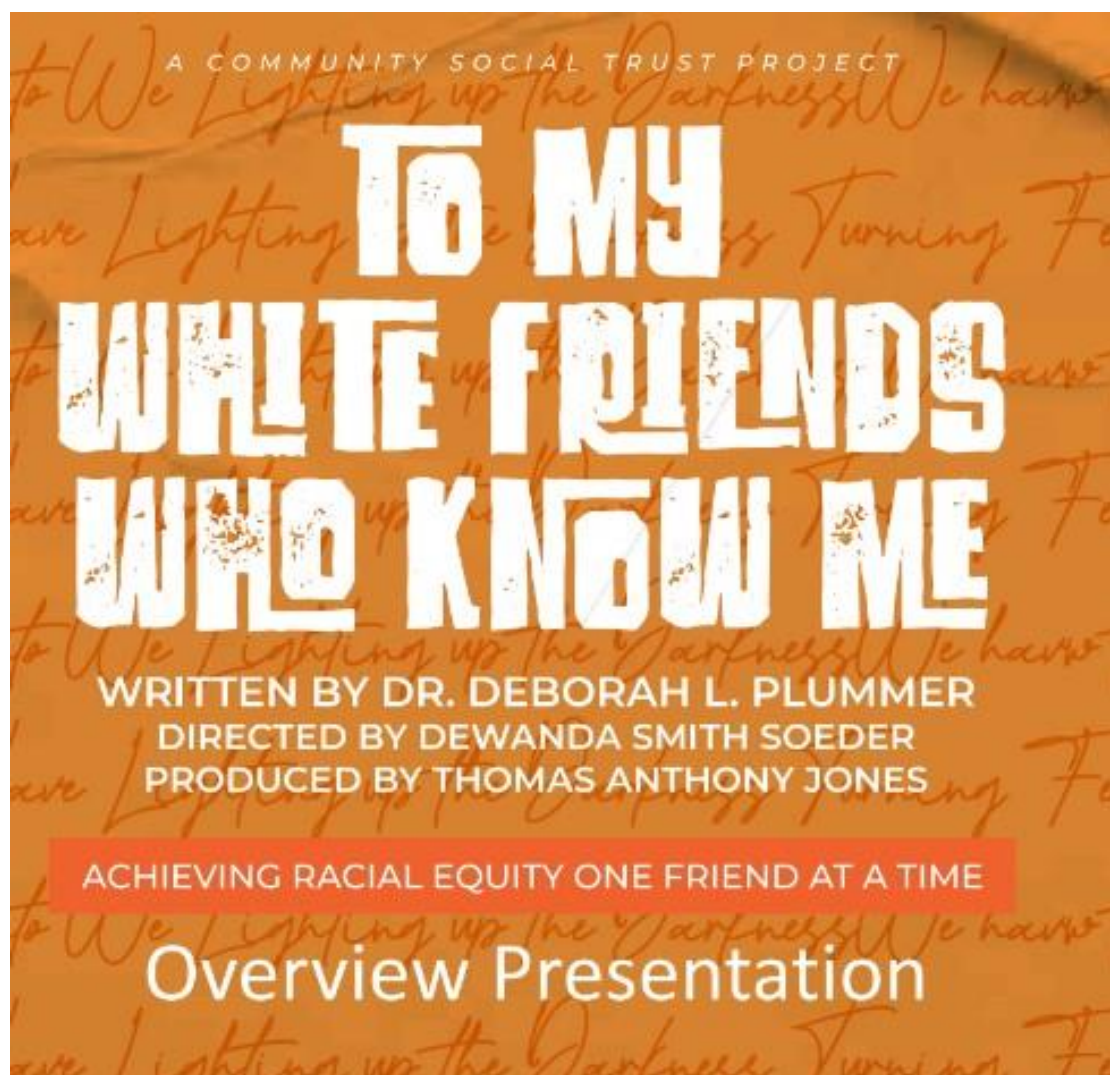

Update: GCC Youth Bindover Team

And an “if only” opportunity for you to make a difference!

At GCC's *Justice for Our Children Action* last January, those of us who attended were deeply disturbed to learn that **Cuyahoga County sends more children to adult court and prison than any other urban county in Ohio**. Since that Action, GCC's Bindover Team, of which I am part, has been meeting with key leaders and stakeholders to learn how our juvenile system works. We have also continued to explore how other urban counties deal with offenses by children in their communities.

One of the differences is that other urban counties use public defenders to represent youthful offenders in 100% of cases, unless there is a conflict. In Cuyahoga County, the Juvenile Court judge determines whether cases will be represented by public defenders or by court-appointed private attorneys—with the result that currently the majority of cases are represented by private attorneys appointed by the judge. Our Bindover Team believes that public defenders are better suited than private attorneys to represent these serious cases. Public defenders are totally dedicated to representing youth, have more resources (such as social workers to address family trauma), are housed in the same building as the detention center and so can meet regularly with their clients, and they can continue to represent youth who are transferred to adult court, something not all private attorneys can do.

We raised this issue in our meeting with the Juvenile Court judges and are delighted to report that the judges agreed to have GCC representatives attend Juvenile Court hearings in their courtrooms beginning this fall. The Bindover Team cannot do this alone. **We will need a team of volunteers from our GCC member congregations, if we are to cover each and every hearing.**

The goal is to:

1. Document issues of injustice on how youth are being treated and defended and build the case for budgeting for the change that is needed.
2. Make contact with the families of youth facing bindover charges to hear their experience, provide support and invite their participation in addressing the injustices in the current system.

So, if you have been wishing “if only” I could do something to make a difference, here's your opportunity!

I would love for FHC to step forward with a team of 5 to 10 people to join me in this work! If you are thinking, yes, perhaps this is something I can do, please email me: diana@ninthrung.com.

The Team is planning a zoom meeting on **Thursday, September 7, at 7:00 PM** that will give a more complete update on our work—and everything involved in attending a hearing. If you decide to step up as a volunteer, as I hope a number of you will, we will provide training and pair you with a GCC volunteer (likely me) who has previously had experience attending a hearing.

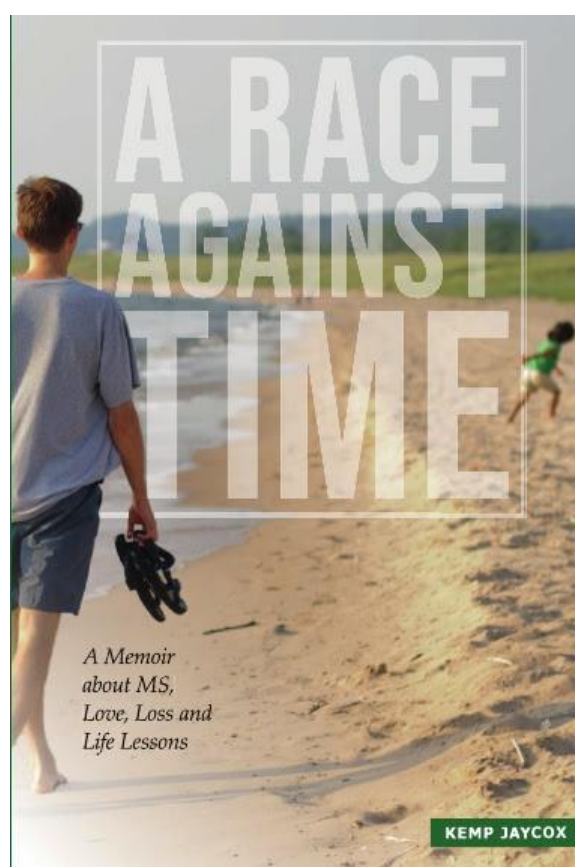
There are descriptions of each in the book.

This year, our initial reading/discussion will be the book, ***An Indigenous Peoples' History Of The United States***, by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz. The author, Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz, is part Cherokee who grew up poor in Oklahoma and worked during the 1960s and '70s advocating for tribal issues while completing her graduate studies in Native American Studies. "Today in the United States, there are more than five hundred federally recognized Indigenous nations comprising nearly three million people, descendants of the fifteen million Native people who once inhabited this land. The centuries-long genocidal program of the U.S. settler-colonial regimen has largely been omitted from history. Acclaimed historian and activist Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz offers a history of the United States told from the perspective of Indigenous peoples and reveals how Native Americans, for centuries, actively resisted the expansion of the U.S. empire." We continue to address historical subjects that impact the present day but are rarely discussed. Regarding indigenous people, we may offer land acknowledgment before meetings and at events but too often we fail to take a deep dive into their history. Our initial reading/discussion is a small step in educating ourselves about the history of the people whose land we occupy and only sometimes acknowledge.

Agitate, Educate, Advocate

That is the simple message which I coined to earmark the mission of Earth Care. Forest Hill Church became one of the first two church congregations in Ohio to earn this distinction from the Presbyterian Church USA nearly 14 years ago. During the initial application, and subsequent yearly renewal to achieve the title of Earth Care Congregation, a number of tasks in Worship, Education, and Outreach needed to be completed. These tasks focused on various ways to care for the environment as a church family, in our own homes, the community, and the wider world.

The Earth Care “Ministry” as it were, while not an official ministry, does have a constituent listed membership---for the purpose of reporting to PCUSA-- but in reality, each one of us in the FHC congregation must take it upon ourselves to become an active disciple of Earth Care. The listed membership has no meetings, no action plans like Justice and Mission or others in the FHC governing organization.

Two of our members- Kemp Jaycox and Steve Sedam, have launched a small group program to acquaint participants with communing with nature through study and outdoor experience. Over these past 14 years we've focused on recycling, judicious usage of our natural resources, improving care of our land, air and water, reducing fossil fuel usage to limit greenhouse gas emissions and working to reduce degradation of air and water in stopping pollution.

Especially, much information has been brought forth on several of the prominent NGOs such as Natural Resources Defense Council, Earth Justice, Rainforest Alliance, Center for Biological Diversity, Defenders of Wildlife, and World Wildlife Fund. There are many others worth our awareness and support. Here's where advocacy comes in. While financial support of such organizations is very important, they are the 'muscle' working in Washington to support legislation favoring the environment or to fight against actions which disfavor the environment. Their call for petitions results not only in a few voices, but often hundreds and thousands of voices. It's often very easy to go on to those organization websites and merely check a box or sign an already-crafted petition. It's the easiest way for an individual to take action on a national basis.

So, the 'mission statement of 'agitate, educate, and advocate' has been manifested mainly through monthly Tower messages. As families we've already done what we could on a local basis. What else would YOU like to do. I would appreciate your response and critique.
